# Multistate Trust Community Engagement Overview

- ✓ The Multistate Trust is committed to involving communities in the cleanup and redevelopment of the former Kerr-McGee sites
- ✓ Goals of Multistate Trust community engagement programs:
  - Share information and be transparent
  - Seek input and allow time for meaningful contribution
  - Actively and respectfully listen to concerns and suggestions
  - Encourage broad participation and engagement from residents, community leaders, and other stakeholders
  - Encourage community members to take leadership roles
  - Use plain, accurate language in all communications—written and oral
  - Slow down to allow community members time to engage and provide input
  - Develop constructive, community-based solutions to challenges
- ✓ An engaged community can help the Multistate Trust meet its overall remediation and redevelopment goals

# Multistate Trust Programs Designed to Achieve Community Engagement Goals

- ✓ Hold regular, in-person community meetings where possible
- ✓ Offer easy telephone/in person access to real, live people who can offer support and information
- ✓ Distribute factsheets, community surveys, and other written materials
- ✓ Foster partnerships and relationships with local organizations, community leaders, and local governments
- ✓ Host other community events and gathering opportunities.
- ✓ Maintain Site-specific websites to share information and seek input

# **Community Meetings**

- ✓ Regularly scheduled community meetings, with in person and virtual options
- ✓ Accessible locations, with food where helpful to increase participation
- ✓ Drop-in sessions for those who cannot attend community meetings
- ✓ Pre- and post-meetings with government leaders, community advocates, and residents

- Small-group, topic-specific meetings:
  - Contractor information sessions
  - Training opportunities for local contractors
  - Redevelopment planning open houses, listening sessions, focus groups, etc.

The Multistate Trust will offer competitive hourly compensation for a six-month, part-time term.

Frequently Asked Questions, October 2021

The Multistate Environmental Response Trust (the Multistate Trust) prepared this fact sheet to answer frequently asked questions about the Site.

What is the former Tronox/Kerr-McGee Wood Treating Facility in Bossier City, Louisiana (the Site)?

The Site is where Kerr-McGee Chemical LLC and its predecessors (collectively Kerr-McGee) treated railroad ties with

The Site is where Kerr-McGee | treated railroad tess with a mixture of recosts and fuel oil from 1930 to 1930°T. Nest twas decommissioned in 1988, and all surface structures were removed, except for an office building and some concrete pads. The Site has remained mostly wouth and pads covered since that time. Because of Kerr-McGee's wood treatment operations, crososter-related contamination is present on-Site and off-Site.

Greenfield Environmental Multistate Trust LLC, trustee of the Multistate Environmental Response Trust, owns the Site

The Multistate Trust is a private, independent environmental response trust created as part of the 2011 Tronox bankruptry settlement. Appointed by the United States Bankruptry Court for the Southern District of New York, the Multistate Trust is responsible for owning, investigating, cleaning up, and facilitating recuests of hundreds of former

Tronox/Kerr-McGee sites, including this Site in Bossier City under Louisiana Department of Environmental Quality

The Multistate Trust, under the oversight and approval of LDEQ, conducted a series of investigations to build on data initially collected by former Site owners. These investigations are documented in a series of reports, prepared under Louisland's Risk Evaluation/Corrective Action Program (RECAP). Concondivater monitoring is ongoing; groundwater sampling is being performed twice per year at 20 Site monitoring wells (located both on-Site and off-Site)

Has the Multistate Trust investigated the contamination at and/or near the Site?

The ±32-acre site consists of two parcels: (1) the Main Property (also known as the East Property), which includes ±26 acres east of Hamilton Road, where most of the wood treatment and processing is believed to have occurred; and

(2) the West Property, which








# Written Materials – Technical/Cleanup Plans

- ✓ Planning documents designed to protect health and safety of residents and workers and to minimize disturbance to the community include:
  - Health and Safety Plan
  - Work Plan/Excavation Plan
  - Utilities Identification Plan
  - Air Monitoring Plan
  - Dust and Odor Control Plan
  - Noise Control Plan
  - Transportation and Disposal Plan/Traffic Control
  - Decontamination Plan
  - Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan
  - Landscape Maintenance Plan
- ✓ Plans are based on industry standards but include details specific to the work
- ✓ Plans of most potential interest to communities are posted on the Site-specific websites

- ✓ Email distribution
